formally launched.

WONG Man-lung: We hope that this estate could sustain for another 15 years. While

conservation is important, we also hope that the residents could live

comfortably and happily with a sense of belonging.

Sin-fun:

About 30 per cent of the residents in Ping Shek Estate are elderly people, and the number of youths is not small either. The Estate indeed has a mix

of three generations – the elderly, the middle-aged and the youth.

Voice Over: Mr. WONG, now 94 years old, is a resident of Ping Shek Estate and lives

on the 9th floor. Before the revitalisation, no lift could directly reach his

floor.

Ping Shek Estate Resident

WONG Chor-kin: In the past, I had to take the lift to the 8th or 10th floor. If I went to the

10th, I would have to walk down one floor. If I went to the 8th, I would have to climb up one floor. I was still young then. At my elderly age now, I have to hold on to something when going up and down, and to walk step by

step slowly. This can be quite a strenuous ordeal.

Screen Content: Mr. WONG taking a lift from the floor he lives on.

WONG Man-lung: Some floors are not accessible by lifts at all. Even if a lift was to be added,

not all floors would have exits. So, with this revitalisation programme, we add exits on all floors. Upon completion of the revitalisation works, I

believe the elderly will find it very satisfying to live here.

Voice Over: Also, Ms YU, a housewife, has been living here for over 30 years. Like

other residents, she has always hoped that the old-style laundry facilities

could be improved.

Screen Content: Ms YU hanging clothes with the broadwise laundry rack provided by the

Housing Department.

Key on caption: YU Po-chun

YU Po-chun: The old way of hanging laundry is what people called "three joss sticks",

i.e. we hanged clothes on three bamboo poles and then extended them out. This way of hanging laundry requires much effort. Since moving in, I've only done this once as I'm afraid of the danger. The Housing Department is really good. It is willing to listen to us, and has installed a broadwise

laundry rack for us.

WONG Man-lung: We tried to install a broadwise rack outside the window to replace the

"three joss sticks" laundry racks. This has made hanging laundry more convenient. With the use of this rope, the clothes can be easily dried

outdoors.

Voice Over: While many elderly people live in the housing estate, there are many

youngsters as well. Their needs are quite different.

Ping Shek Estate Resident

LEE Ka-wai: A housing estate without recreational facilities but only tables and chairs is

boring, lifeless and sluggish. A football or basketball court allows youngsters to play sports here, and even elderly people can come here to

play ball games and do some exercises.

LEE CHUNG Our whole team is very enthusiastic in responding to the residents' needs,

Sin-fun: e.g. to increase fitness facilities such as adding a basketball court. The

improved facilities in fact are comparable to those of new housing estates

now.

LEE CHUNG Sin-fun: We listen to the residents' opinions. They hope that living in this community can be more convenient and that shopping facilities and restaurants here can be enhanced. We now have new shops as well as the old ones and with this complement, different needs of the residents can be met. Other than hoping that the residents can live comfortably here, we also hope that they can get out of their homes and get to know their own community as well as their neighbours. This is what we aim to achieve.

Voice Over: The 3-year-long Revitalisation Programme was completed in 2014. Not

only has it enabled more than 10,000 residents to continue to enjoy living in Ping Shek Estates, but it has also promoted the conservation and

revitalisation work.
